### 1/2/3 News

Hi Spruce Home Families! In ELA we have been learning our UFLI lessons. Most recently we have learned the consonant diagraphs (ck, sh, "th"-voice on, and "th"-voice off). The FLSZ rule- when we hear f, l, s, or z at the end of a short vowel sound we double the letters when spelling ex: Jeff. We are also learning about the 'heart words' the tricky words to spell that don't follow the rules so we just have to remember them by 'heart'- ex: said, the, from. Students had fun creating their own stories inspired by the Lady Who Swallowed a Fly story. In Health, our nursing students have been teaching us about healthy habits and germs and proper hand washing. In Social Studies/EPBL we have been learning about rural and city communities, various community

workers who work in those communities, and how individuals and communities meet needs and wants. In Grade 1 Math, students are learning to identify, count, and print numbers to 35. In Grade 2 Math, students have learned to skip count by 2's, 5's, and 10s and we currently started place value. Now we will be gearing up for our Remembrance Day service. Mrs. Shillington

## Grade 7/8 News

In Social Studies, I learned the seven teachings and the importance of using the seven teachings in everyday life. We also held our first assembly of the year on Halloween and had a lot of fun playing Fear Factor, a witch's relay, whole school Halloween dance and chase.



## **Volunteering for Operation Red Nose Benefits Prince Albert Elementary Schools**

Eleven Prince Albert elementary schools received \$8,800 from the 2023 Operation Red Nose campaign to assist with their programming. The Prince Albert Lions Club will be sponsoring Operation Red Nose in Prince Albert again in 2024 and is looking for volunteers to make it a successful campaign to keep the city streets safer.

Community volunteers are the key to the success of the program. In 2023 we provided 170 rides to 377 clients who were impaired or who did not feel fit to drive their vehicle. They all got home safely.

Although the service is free, clients usually provide donations, which under the provisions of the Operation Red Nose Program must be allocated to youth groups or groups that support youth in Prince Albert and area. The Prince Albert Lions Club has selected area elementary schools as the recipients of these donations to assist with programming for students.

The program operates on Friday and Saturday evenings. This year will start on Friday, November 29<sup>th</sup>, and run each Friday and Saturday to December 21<sup>st</sup> plus New Year's Eve. We start around 9 pm in the evening and usually run until around 2 am the next morning. New Year's tends to run a bit later due to house parties.

Volunteers must be at least 19 years of age. They are organized into teams of 3 people, an escort driver, a designated driver, and a navigator. All volunteers require a police background check (provided at no cost) and are insured for liability by our provincial sponsor the SGI. Volunteers do not have to use their vehicles since escort vehicles are provided by vehicle dealerships in the city.

Volunteers can choose to work one night, a weekend, or the whole season. Come as an individual or put together a team of 3 people. We find New Years Eve is one of our busiest nights. Volunteers are provided with food, coffee, and camaraderie during the evenings they work.
